On December 1, 2017 we started the 19th National Olympiad of the English Language for Students of Technical Universities.

Each of the 15 Polish technical universities participating in this event held an internal competition to select the students for the second stage. This year the number reached almost 250 students.

The national final is going to take place on April 20 and 21, 2018, and is going to include:

a. <u>Written test: Friday, 20.04.2018, 12.00</u> (duration: 120 minutes without breaks),
b. <u>Oral stage: Friday, 20.04.2018</u>, starting from 15.15,
c. <u>Presentations: Saturday, 21.04.2018</u>
– presentations of 10 students with the highest score from the written and oral parts.

The list of students will be announced on Saturday, before the event, at 8.45.

Topics for presentations this year are:
