Broad Perspectives on Language Education in the Globalized World

6-8 September 2018, Poznan University of Technology



n September 6-8, 2018, Poznan University of Technology held the 15th International CercleS Conference (the European Confederation of Language Centers in Higher Education) organized by Center of Languages and Communication at Poznan University of Technology.

The conference topics included issues in the following areas: adaptation of curricula to the needs of digital natives, changing teacher's role (LSP, CLIL), evaluation, self-assessment and certification, European projects in higher education, the role of non-governmental organizations in building intercultural awareness, supporting intercultural interactions among students, building communication competences among students, contemporary trends in language education, preparing students to participate in international programs, managing language centers, promoting self-awareness and self-discipline in acquiring a foreign language, discovering new paths in glottodidactics, challenges in developing specialized language areas, the role of e-learning learning and new media in language acquisition.

The event was preceded by a series of pre-conference workshops, which were carried out on September 5. The conference was attended by representatives of 23 countries from around the world.

If someone, two (and soon to be three!) years ago told me I would be working full-time as a teacher of English I would have laughed at them making such a ridiculous statement. Not only due to the fact that, like some of my colleagu-

Centre of Languages and Communication

Centre of Languages and Communication (CLC) at Poznan University of Technology (PUT) is involved in numerous activities and events related to foreign languages and language teaching.

First and foremost, we are focused on teaching languages for specific purposes, which translates into teaching technical language at PUT.

Our activities, however, reach far beyond mere language teaching.

We always strive to offer more and provide support in a wide range of areas.
