Seminar for CLC teachers Language for specific purposes at PUT language courses

This October saw the employees of the Centre of Languages and Communication (CLC) at Poznan University of Technology at a seminar at Biedrusko. They had the opportunity to increase their qualifications at a seminar on teaching language for specific purposes, as it is taught at PUT language courses.

The main goal of the seminar was to exchange information and experiences on teaching foreign languages for specific purposes and to familiarize the CLC teachers with numerous activities taking place at CLC. The first day started on a more serious note, as during the first day each of the specialised CLC teams presented the scope of their work

and discussed the potential for further development. The first day presented a great opportunity to meet and learn more about the work we do every day. The highlight of the day was a short workshop on integration and applying games during classes. The second day brought workshops on preparing exams or online safety, and concluded with a lecture by Professor Krystyna Droździeł-Szelest on modern developments and trends in the methodology of language teaching.

This seminar was a great opportunity to meet and exchange ideas in a more relaxed setting, which is nearly impossible in everyday hustle and bustle of intense university life.



POLISH WEEK

Greeting Erasmus students during Polish Week has become our tradition and this year was wildly successful!

In the last week of September almost 120 participants from all over the world gathered in one place. Students came from Europe: Spain, Italy, Portugal, Greece, France, Finland, Hungary, Germany, Romania, Turkey, and other more distant parts of the world: Jordan, Palestine, Afghanistan, and even China and Peru. This year we also hosted Chinese teachers who are a part of New Silk Route project. On the first day they participated in orientation events and were given the most important information about their stay in Poznań, only to move to more exciting cultural events and exploration of Poznań and its surroundings.

During the following days of the tightly-packed itinerary the students visited historical sites of Kórnik castle and Rogalin palace, after which they had the opportunity to try a traditional Polish dinner, with the obligatory chicken soup. The following day they thoroughly enjoyed a visit to Festung Posen fortifications and a walk along the concise version of the Royal-Imperial Route. The tour that started at Śródka and Cathedral Island, and continued to the Old Town, showed the students the long and rich history of Poznań and Poland. The magnificent architecture of the Old Market Square, interesting stories and legends connected with historical buildings surrounding it and, naturally, the story of the goats, made a great impression on everyone.

The final day brought students to another interesting, albeit slightly more relaxed place, which was Lech Brewery. After a tour of the brewery and learning everything there is to learn about beer-making process, they were able to sample a finished product in the onsite pub.



Polish Week presents students with an opportunity to learn more about the place where they will be spending the following semester, but it is also a chance to meet other Erasmus students. This year a wonderful weather made the experience even more memorable.
