

Workshop: The new role of international officers

Internationalisation of higher education is going through a shift from (just) mobility to internationalisation of the home curriculum for all students. Academic staff are now the key players in internationalised teaching and learning. This new situation calls for a change of role of international officers.

This two day interactive workshop focuses on his new role. We will first look at current trends and meanings in internationalisation of the curriculum and then focus on a number of questions. What policies do we need for internationalisation of the curriculum? How can international officers be effective in supporting academic staff? Which role do other stakeholders play a role in the process? How do we monitor progress and what do we do when there is not enough progress?

To answer these questions, we will analyse examples and discuss how they relate to the situation at our universities. While the setting is slightly different at every university, it is possible to jointly map out some success factors and effective strategies. This is also the basis for a discussion on how partner universities can support each other in internationalising curricula
